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There is a high profile for the subject and a good reputation for PE and school sport. Summerville achieved the GOLD award School Games Mark for the 2nd time for the school year 2022/2023.

James Seddon (formally GO4IT Sports) has delivered outdoor PE in the mornings, in our school, during the school term 2022/2023, with class teachers shadowing, then taking over the lessons. Class teachers have also been teaching indoor Dance/Gym, alternating each half term. Teachers had dance training through Dance to School with Eve Murphy, this year

The PE has been done through 60-minute sessions, twice a week throughout school.

Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:

All subject leaders to look at opportunities within their subject to make the learning more active.

All staff to motivate and support children in promoting PE, Gym and Dance to improve fitness across school by actively taking part, where possible.

To enter a wider variety of sports, including specifically inclusive sports for SEND children.

Staff to teach and take part in all PE lessons

All children when entering year 1 to be grouped into their values (houses), to follow through to year 6, so that the children gain a sense of belonging within that group.

Key achievements to date:

Our curriculum is based around the sports we enter throughout each half term, through Salford Primary School Sports Association with EYFS based around Fundamental Movement and Skills and year 1 and 2 based around fundamental movement and skills and also, introductions to invasion games, net and wall games, athletics and striking and fielding games.

Year 4 swimming sessions continue throughout the year, with some year 5's still attending until they pass their Key Stage 2 pass.



Future plans for the further development of PE across school:

To provide CPD sessions for some areas of PE (where needed) and for NQTs, to approach Steve Busby regarding this.

To continue to ensure that PE is a vital part to pupils' physical and emotional development, health and well-being linking with PSHE.

To enter the Salford Primary Schools Sports Association leagues and tournaments and any other relevant extra curricula activities where possible, to provide children with inclusive, engaging and challenging PE opportunities, where every child can reach their full potential.

To continue to foster enthusiasm and enjoyment of PE and sport across the whole school from Early Years to Year 6.

Key achievements to date:

The school has good links to local community sports clubs e.g. Salford City Swimming and Water Polo Club, Swinton Swimming Club and higher profile clubs such as Sale Sharks and Salford Reds Rugby Clubs, Manchester United.

Overall Judgement and Impact: To date

90.6% of children in EYFS are On Track or at Greater Depth. 94.8% of children in KS1 are On Track or at Greater Depth. 92.3% of children in lower KS2 are On Track or at Greater Depth.

88.8% of children in upper KS2 are On Track or at Greater Depth.

Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:

To train up sports leaders in Year 6 to promote sport at lunchtimes alongside lunchtime supervisors and to work alongside the PE Lead to organise intra sports and sports day. To ensure that the pupil premium children are being encouraged to attend the after-school clubs with a possible reduction/school subsiding the cost of the sessions. to achieve the GOLD standard in PE again in school year 2023/2024 by increasing the participation level in inter school competitions to ensure that there are further opportunities for an A, B and C team to represent our school at these events.

To continue to provide to 2 x 1 hour PE sessions, including 1 hour of dance and gym, alternating each half term.

Evaluation of PE in School

- The employment of specialist sports coach to deliver sessions
- We have played competitive games in intra sports and inter school cluster competitions this year, gaining
 places in the Salford Schools Rugby finals at Salford reds and The year 3, Manchester United Emerging
 Talent football finals.
- The children are demonstrating an improved knowledge and awareness of healthy eating and the importance of how activity and diet impact on improved health, fitness and well-being through our PSHE curriculum and Year 4 also cover the theory side to water safety and identifying beach flags and hazards around water, through a separate Water Safety booklet.
- With James Seddon we have developed a framework of benchmarking for assessment within all areas of the PE curriculum and assessments are also recorded on Insight.
- We encourage pupils to adopt active and healthy lifestyles out of school with our school-club links.
- Summerville have achieved our 2nd GOLD award School Games Mark for the 2022/2023 school year..
- We have secured Rugby and Healthy lifestyle coaching for years 3, 4, 5 & 6, with Sales Sharks Rugby Club
